Workshop 1 Paint a Landscape with Philip Hickingbotham Learn about and experiment with acrylic paint on canvas to paint an outdoor scene! What makes a

Workshop 2 Still Life Painting with Philip Hickingbotham

MURCHISON FIRE BRIGADE CFA BY BOB LANGFORD

As we move slowly into Autumn one of the questions often asked us at CFA is 'when are fire restrictions going to be lifted? The answer to that question is that at the time of writing we do not know. The change of season often brings a relaxation of regulations however this year because of the extremely dry late summer period, elevated temperatures and vegetation growth the FIRE DANGER PERIOD IS STILL IN FORCE and likely to remain in force until after the Easter holiday period.

The CFA have extensive and helpful guidelines on the subject of fire safety during the FDP so please visit the CFA Website 'Can I or Can't I' for this information. Hard copies to take away can be found in the local Murchison shops and Post Office. Good information, and free!

Please note that lighting a fire in the open air during a Fire Danger Period without a permit is an offence and can bring a hefty penalty.

For Agricultural Grass and Stubble only burns permits under Schedule 13 MAY be issued after application. Such permits are issued subject to strict compliance with certain laid down procedures and arrangements and Farmers wishing to make application for a permit are encouraged to apply via Fire Permits Victoria at firepermits.vic.gov.au.

CFA Murchison, despite the relatively quiet summer and the absence of major incidents in our region, are still concerned about the number of grass/paddock/scrub fires we are called out to attend. Often, we discover an incident started by the use of machinery in inappropriate weather conditions and sometimes without means to extinguish a resulting fire. Please remember to plan accordingly and ask if in doubt. It is basic common sense. Reading and using the information provided in the CFA publication 'Can I or Can't I' is easier than explaining to a Magistrate.

The Brigade has been busy on all fronts of fire and accident-related activity across both the Murchison area and support to other Brigades requiring assistance in the management and control of emergency situations.

You may be surprised to learn that there are opportunities other than operational firefighting duties, for instance in brigade support, fundraising, community liaison and equipment maintenance to name a few.

THE VERY INTRIGUING VERRI STORY

THE VERY INTRIGUING VERRI STORY


The history surrounding Prisoner of War (POW) Camp 13 Murchison, is a significant part of Murchison's history and when it was functioning during World War 2, had considerable impact on the local population and town. Enquiries about Camp 13 via emails to Murchison Historical Society and contact on our web-site, are nearly as popular as the interest shown in the Murchison meteorite! Camp 13 Murchison was the largest purpose-built POW camp in Australia and was headquarters and point of control for all the POW camps across the nation. It was able to accommodate 4000 prisoners and over time held German, Italian and Japanese military personnel and merchant seamen. A recent visit from descendants of an Italian gentleman who was a POW in the Camp has revealed even more interesting history of those who spent years in Camp 13.

An Italian, Dante Giovanni VERRI, had a dramatic arrival in Australia in June 1940, and, as he had been captured only 2 days after Italy entered the War, he was to spend 6 ½ years of captivity in Australia and endure a great number of moves from one Camp to another.

Dante was a Baker on the Italian passenger liner SS Romolo, a ship used to transport migrants to Australia. Once Italy entered into WW2 on 10th of June 1940, HMAS Manoora, an armed merchant cruiser that was patrolling the Australian coastline, was ordered to capture her as the ship was considered a desirable prize. The Romolo had fled the port of Brisbane a few days before and was heading north east with Manoora in pursuit. Romolo's Captain was ordered to scuttle the ship rather than be captured. Life boats were lowered over the side and crew set fire to the engine rooms. With smoke billowing from the listing ship, Manoora fired the 6-inch gun to hasten the demise of the ship. This was the first Australian Naval engagement with the enemy in World War 2. No lives were lost as the Manoora rescued the passengers and crew, who disembarked at Townsville.

Being civilians, they were classified as Enemy Aliens to be placed under guard with Internees who were residents of Australia but because they were of German or Italian descent, considered a threat to Australian security. They were accommodated in large vacant buildings such as old goals and mansions. As time went on numbers grew and with Military prisoners being shipped to Australia as well needing accommodation, purpose-built Camps were erected across the country.



RESCUE OF CREW AND PASSENGERS

Dante was 43 years old at the time of his rescue from the Romolo. He came from the village of Castelletto d'Orba, Alessandria, Northern Italy. He was married to Anna and they had 2 sons. He was at first held in Army Barracks at Gaythorne, Brisbane, then over the years spent time in Hay (NSW), Loveday (SA), and in Victoria at East Whorouly near Myrtleford, and Camp 13 Murchison. It is unclear why he was moved around so much; maybe it could have been that his skills as a Baker were in demand. His family report that he did not write one letter home to Alessandria in all the time he was in Australia. He signs his name on official documents quite clearly, so it was unlikely he was illiterate but perhaps just not a letter writer. In 1941, Merchant Seamen were re-classified from Enemy Aliens to Prisoners of War, which would explain some of his moves, as POW's were generally held in different camps to Civilians. As a POW he could receive better financial support.

Dante was repatriated to Italy in December 1946 on the ship Moreton Bay, the reason for the delay from the end of the War to that point in time, was the shortage of suitable ships.

The Verri family who visited Murchison recently related that when Dante walked into the family home, Gianfranco, Dante's son, who was 7 years old, did not recognise him as he had only been a baby when he last saw his father. Gianfranco had thought that his brother, who was 13 years older than him, was his father. That first meeting made a deep impression on Gianfranco, and he still has a strong mental picture of his father standing in the doorway wearing a red woollen coat. This coat would have been the Australian army issue 'great coat' – died a burgundy colour to identify POW's. It would have been very necessary as he arrived in Italy mid-winter, after leaving Murchison in the Summer.

It was a delight to meet 3 generations of this family, to share with them our local history about the World War 2 Camps in our area, to supply some more information about the experience Dante would have gone through and to learn his personal story.

An interesting post-script: Dante's son, Gianfranco was also a seaman and met his wife Rosemary, an American, on board a ship and they now live in Boston, USA. Their daughter, Giovanna met her husband, Spiro, of Greek ancestry while travelling around the world and they now live in Sydney. Their two lovely daughters, Giulia and Valentina accompanied their parents and grandparents on their family history journey.

After leaving the Murchison Heritage Centre, the family drove to the site of Camp 13 to view some of the remnants that can be seen from the road and the next day visited Myrtleford, to meet with locals and learn about POW Camp 5 at East Whorouly Camp Dante spent 3 years of his Australian captivity.

Federal Member for Nicholls, Sam Birrell MP has slammed an advertisement authorised by the Australian Government attempting to justify the destructive water buybacks legislated by the Albanese Government.

Mr Birrell said the video advertisement, which is currently running in Nicholls, uses emotive language and doomsday scenarios to attempt to justify the Labor Government's plan to harm regional communities through water buybacks as part of the new Murray Darling Basin Plan. "This advertisement is simplistic, deluded, misleading, partisan and intends to justify the destruction of agriculture in Australia," Mr Birrell said.

"This advertising campaign smacks of a partisan political advertisement not the work of a body that should be focused on science. "It's sad that an organisation that once did have some credibility is now conducting itself in this way," he said. Mr Birrell said the advertisement is offensive to regional communities who will be impacted by water buybacks. "Labor's new plan for water will increase costs for producers and manufacturers, impact jobs and the economic prosperity of Murray Darling Basin communities," Mr Birrell said. "Murray Darling Basin communities grow fresh clean food for Australia and the world which drives economic growth for our Nation.

"Instead of celebrating the regions, this Labor Government continues to make it harder for regional and rural Australians to do what they do best," he said.

Ute Tax Makes No Sense

Federal Member for Nicholls, Sam Birrell MP, says the Albanese Government's family car and ute tax makes no sense and the Minister for Climate Change and Energy, Chris Bowen is struggling to explain it.

Mr Birrell asked the Minister in Parliament about the limitations of the LDV electric ute which has a maximum range of 300 kilometres, but fully loaded up, travels just 150 kilometres.

"Minister Bowen responded by quoting an out-of-date article to trumpet that the electric LDV ET60 ute was cheaper than its diesel twin but only in New Zealand which has vehicle efficiency standards," Mr Birrell said.

"Importantly, Mr Bowen confirmed that internal combustion utes are more expensive, but what he failed to say was that New Zealand scrapped its unfair 'ute tax' in December 2023."

NZ Transport Minister Simeon Brown dumped the Clean Car scheme saying that it "...provided subsidies for people purchasing electric vehicles while taxing hardworking farmers and tradies who have little choice about the type of vehicle they need for work, is inequitable and fiscally irresponsible."

"Even though the electric ute was subsidised and discounted further in 'clean car clearout' sales before the unfair policy was repealed, just 219 new electric utes were registered in NZ in 2023," Mr Birrell said.

"The Ford Ranger was the top selling vehicle in NZ for the ninth consecutive year despite a 14 per cent drop in sales because of the additional tax applied under the Clean Car scheme."

"The electric ute was cheaper because it was subsidised - the diesel twin was more expensive because it was taxed higher - and New Zealand woke up to the folly of a ute tax."

"Despite the New Zealand experience the Albanese Government is hellbent on applying the same unfair tax on families, tradies and farmers under its fuel emissions standards," Mr Birrell said.

Australia's top three best-selling vehicles in 2023 were utes, with each facing a carbon penalty of up to \$17,950 for the Ford Ranger, \$14,490 for the Toyota Hi-lux and \$13,830 for the Isuzu D-Max respectively by 2029 under Labor's proposal.

"I'm a supporter of the uptake of electric where they are appropriate and a form of fuel efficiency standards, however, it can't come at the expense of people whom an EV is not appropriate for because of the work they do or where they live," Mr Birrell said.

"Thousands of people in my electorate need these vehicles to perform their work and they will be forced to pay a high price to replace their vehicle simply because there is no viable alternative."

Lovell calls for long overdue Greater Shepparton bus review

The state Labor government's 2021 Bus Plan is failing to deliver for residents of the Greater Shepparton area.

It has been 15 years since the bus network in Greater Shepparton was last reviewed, and growth in the municipality means that a new review is long overdue.

Other regional towns are having their bus networks updated, but Shepparton has been forgotten. In parliament this week Wendy Lovell, Liberal Member for Northern Victoria, called on the Minister for Public and Active Transport to initiate a review of current bus services within the Greater Shepparton area, paying attention to the frequency, location, accessibility, and consistency of services.

Regional towns are growing, and public transport services must grow with them to ensure that all groups within the community are able to participate in social life. Youth, the elderly, and people with a disability, often don't have access to a motor vehicle and face social exclusion without public transport options that meet their needs.

Mooroopna, Tatura, and other small towns in the area suffer from sparse and infrequent bus services that limit the ability of residents to come into Shepparton for medical treatment or shopping, and similarly limit tourism from Shepparton into the surrounding towns.

Severely restricted weekend services mean that some residents are forced to walk long distances to their centres of religious worship on Saturday or Sunday.



"It's clear that the bus network in the Greater Shepparton region does not adequately cater for the area's growing and diverse community", said Ms Lovell.

"When the State Government released its 2021 Bus Plan, Labor declared that it was committed to delivering bus services that better match public transport needs.

"The Minister needs to back up that statement by conducting a proper review of the Greater Shepparton bus network."
