So, a huge thank-you. I would also like to thank the Sub-Committee for the continued support of this Appeal, we hope to conduct the Appeal in a similar format next year.




Tatura Bowls Club Charity Bowls Day.

GOAL SETTING

I recently converted the word GOALS to an acronym:

Getting
Organized (and)
Ahead (in your)
Life
Style

I first heard about goal setting in the mid-1990's when I was in my early 40's and have used it since then with amazing results. Two stories I heard at the time convinced me of the benefits of written goals. The first related to a follow up study of Harvard University Law students about five years after graduation. The ones that had written goals whilst at University (and had continued on) were much further ahead in their field than those who did not have written goals (the majority).

The second story related to an annual conference where the speaker asked each person to write down on a card the ten goals they wanted to achieve in the next year. These cards were then placed into envelopes and collected. When the group re-assembled for the next conference a year later, the cards were handed out and over 80% of the goals had been achieved even though the people had only written them down once and had not seen the card since the last conference.

When you spend time thinking about and then writing down your goals, the universe responds. It is suggested that only 3% of people have written goals - these are usually the high achievers.

Goal Setting will fast track your life. I am not talking about the ten minutes to midnight on New Year's Eve promises, but real goal setting. Written goals, not dreams. What I try to do is set aside at least a few hours in a quiet area at the start of each year. I often put on good classical music, no phone or screen and an old-fashioned piece of paper and a pen / biro. No distractions - this is serious stuff.

Start at the top and write down everything you want to do, experience, achieve, obtain etc. in the next ten years. Write them one below another – not across the page. **Think Big.** If that little voice in your head starts saying you cannot do that or own that – ignore it and write it down. Do not think about how you can achieve it – that will come later. Keep writing for as long as the ideas flow and then sit for at least another 15 minutes and others will come to your mind. If you cannot come up with a list of 50 to 100 things to do, experience, achieve, obtain in the next ten years of their life then you have not been thinking big enough.

Next I go back to the top of my list and write a 1, 3, 5 or 10 next to each goal indicating 1 year or 3 years or 5 years etc. Then I take all my one year goals and write them down in an Excel or Word document and sort them into groups such as Personal (usually revolves about losing some weight !!), Relationships, Family, Business or Work, Financial etc. This really helps you to focus.

I then print this list and often laminate it and place it in my shower. Reading your goals every day will really focus you on taking the necessary steps to make them happen. Always work on the one goal that could completely transform your life and just watch the results happen.

Each year repeat the process again; starting all over again. What I do after I have made a new list is pull out my old written list from the previous year, just in case I missed something. Do this each year and I promise you that in five years you will barely recognize your current life.

Life is not a dress rehearsal and we only get one go so make the most of it. Live life to the full.


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MURCHISON FIRE BRIGADE CFA

Well it's that time of the year again. The change of seasons and the weather telling us that it is time to keep warm. Cooler weather is settling in but whilst we continue to enjoy the milder days of Autumn, Winter is just around the corner. During Summer we tend to concentrate on the dangers of bush and wildfire however as home fire safety is a full 365 day project throughout the year it does take on a greater emphasis in the cooler months with the use of home heating appliances. This will be dealt with more fully in next months newsletter but just a couple of points to start the ball rolling. Heating and Smoke Alarms.

Before we get into the depths of winter it might be a good start to have your heating appliances checked out by an individual licensed for that particular task. Check smoke alarms, which should be fitted in all residences in Victoria, and if a solid fuel heating appliance is used ensure your flue is cleaned of last years residues prior to lighting. A good reference guide is published by CFA entitled "Home Fire Safety", the content of which is available either online in the CFA website "cfa.vic.gov.au" or in hard copy from local shops in the Murchison shopping area and Post Office. Copies are also obtainable from the CFA Murchison Fire Brigade station when open, usually Sunday mornings.

Remember the jingle "CLEAN YA FLUE, BLUE!" and start off your heating season well.

Smoke Alarms. Only working smoke alarms save lives. A working smoke alarm provides you with early warning of a fire and gives you time to escape safely. It is a fact that you are more likely to die in a residential fire without a working smoke alarm. Smoke alarms should be tested regularly. A good time to test is twice a year when clocks are changed. Replace batteries annually to be safe. New Lithium batter powered smoke alarms which have a 10 year lifespan are available from major hardware retailers and are recommended by CFA. Contact CFA by emailing smokealarms@cfa.vic.gov.au

Another CFA initiative is the FREE installation of the new Lithium batter powered 10 year lifespan smoke alarms for residents who are unable to supply, install or maintain their own smoke alarms. Murchison Fire Brigade will resume their supply and fitting program for qualified residents in early May 2024. Please see the attachment for details.

Congratulations to the Murchison Fire Brigade Team who organized an extremely successful Good Friday Appeal for the Royal Childrens Hospital. Their organization and dedication to this event was second to none. Congratulations also to the volunteers who assisted in this event.

The Brigade has been quietly busy on several fronts lately with our involvement in local emergencies involving burn offs, house and machinery shed fires and road traffic accidents, to name a few. The high standard of management and training for these events has resulted in a safe and personnel incident free Fire Danger Period over this last summer.

Fire Restrictions in our area were lifted on 8th April last and permits are no longer required for burning off however CFA do politely recommend that any burn off planned is registered. This prevents smoke sightings reported by public resulting in a turn out of the local fire brigade. We are duty bound to investigate all matters reported in by public and often, especially at this time of the year brigades are turned out to unregistered burn offs which are not emergency situations. CFA is an emergency management organisation and a turn out to a non emergency incident is a waste of resources and detracts from brigades ability to attend any actual emergency which might arise. Please REGISTER YOUR BURN OFFS! Don't cause firefighters to rush to your property for no reason. You can register easily by phoning the hotline 1800 668 511 or online at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au. It's easy and it's free!

If you happen to live within town limits please check with the council first. There may be a special ordinance governing burning off in town limits. And please don't forget to inform your neighbours. This, like advising CFA is only a common courtesy. And please don't leave your burn unattended. Remember also, you are the only one responsible for what you do.

Murchison Fire Brigade now provides free smoke alarm installations for residents who are unable to supply, install or maintain their own smoke alarms. Smoke alarms installed contain a 10-year lithium battery, meaning that the battery lasts for the life of the smoke alarm.

72% of fatal house fires start in the bedroom and occur while a person is sleeping.

By law, all homes are required to have smoke alarms in hallways between bedrooms and the rest of the home, but fire services also recommend having them installed in bedrooms.

Regardless of the type of smoke alarms you have:

- Test monthly -use a broom stick to press the button on your smoke alarms, hold until the alarm beeps three times
- Dust regularly
- All smoke alarms (hard-wired and standalone) need to be replaced every 10 years
- Smoke alarms should be installed on the ceiling at least 30cm from the wall

If you have smoke alarms with replaceable batteries, you need to change the batteries annually. Remember -only working smoke alarms save lives.



De-snagging on the Goulburn River at Murchison

In the early years of Murchison settlement, paddle steamers ventured into the Goulburn River from the Murray, transporting produce to markets and delivering supplies to farmers at Mooroopna, Murchison, Tahbilk and Seymour, when the river levels allowed.

In times of flood the river would flow rapidly and rise to alarming levels; the power and volume of the water caused trees to be dislodged and logs were washed into the stream. These trees and logs in the river caused dangerous snags that could damage or impede passage of any water craft, large or small and were a constant problem for paddle steamers.

Due to the disruption of river transport by the snags, both in the Murray and Goulburn, the government of the day imported a paddle steamer specifically to de-snag the rivers. It was a 'stern-wheeler', 26 metres long, with a shallow draft of about half a metre. It was assembled at Echuca and given the name of PS Melbourne. Captain James Hill, who qualified as a Master Mariner at Cornwell, England, was appointed in charge of the vessel when it was launched in 1865.

The PS Melbourne cleared snags along the Goulburn as far up stream as Seymour. It was dangerous work as explosives were sometimes used to displace large snags. The log-book recorded monthly totals of 300 – 400 snags removed, the size of one tree having a girth of 10 metres and another log 37 metres long. It must have been difficult to manage such large timbers, and two men lost their lives when crushed by logs. Captain Hill's wife Grace sometimes accompanied her husband and can be seen on the top deck of PS Melbourne along with the notable pot-plant flower garden on board in this 1875 photograph, taken near the site of the disused Punt crossing in Murchison. With a cable from PS Melbourne threaded through a pulley attached high up in a study tree on the bank, then placed around a snag in the water, the on-board winch would drag the timber up onto the bank. The photo also shows the crew on the river bank and cables used to winch the logs well away from the water-line. (If viewing on-line, zoom in for detail).




With the arrival of the railway in 1880, demand for paddle steamer transport along the Goulburn diminished and then ended in 1891 once the Goulburn Weir was operational.

"Two grant opportunities are available and include up to \$10,000 for local community projects and activities and up to \$150,000 for major commemorative projects," Mr Birrell said.

The funding supports groups and individuals to promote appreciation and understanding of the experiences of service, the roles that those who served have played and to preserve or provide access to information about Australia's wartime heritage.

Labor fails on promised safety barrier repairs The State Labor Government has failed to meet its own deadline for repair work to wire rope safety barriers that was promised to commence in March. It is now mid-April and works have still not begun. In parliament on 22 February, Liberal Member for Northern Victoria Wendy Lovell called on the Minister for Roads and Road Safety to immediately repair damaged safety barriers on the Hume Freeway, Midland Highway and Goulburn Valley Highway.

On the Midland Highway between Mooroopna and Byrneside, large sections of wire rope in the centre of the road have been lying on the ground since well before Christmas.

On many stretches of road there are trees growing through and over the wire rope barriers, which will undermine and damage the barriers and road surface if they are not removed.

After Ms Lovell's call for urgent attention to the condition of wire rope barriers, the Victorian Government told ABC Radio that repairs were set for March, including along the Midland Highway near Mooroopna.

An inspection on 10 April of the Midland Highway near Mooroopna revealed that not only were the repairs not complete, they had not even started.

Prior to installation the Government claimed that wire rope safety barriers were necessary to reduce deaths on rural and regional roads. But flexible safety barriers will only be effective if they are properly maintained. In 2023, 295 lives were lost on Victorian roads – a 22% increase on 2022 and a 15-year high. The latest Transport Accident Commission figures show there have already been 48 road deaths in regional and rural Victoria this year, on track to match the tragic toll of 2023. Road safety, especially in rural and regional areas, must be a top priority for the government.

Tyrrell calls on State Government to open Barmah Forest for firewood collection.

One Nation Member for Northern Victoria Region Rikkie-Lee Tyrrell has called on the Allan Labor Government to open the Barmah Forest for firewood collection for local residents.

Speaking during the adjournment debate directed to Environment Minister Steve Dimopoulos during the regional sitting of State Parliament in Echuca, Mrs Tyrrell spoke of her recent visit to the nearby Barmah Forest and the large amount of deadfall littering the ground throughout the forest.

"I took a drive through the Barmah Forest during the Easter break and was shocked at the potential fire hazard of dead trees lying on the ground," Mrs Tyrrell said.

"The number of fallen dead trees covering the ground is so large they are actually inhibiting new growth and the natural regeneration of the forest."

In her contribution, Mrs Tyrrell again highlighted the lack of firewood collection points in the Moira and Greater Shepparton local government areas, with Moira Shire residents forced to travel to Warrenbayne, south-east of Violet Town to access their closest firewood collection point.

"I continue to be contacted by many constituents who rely on firewood to heat their homes frustrated that they have to travel long distances to get firewood when there is an abundance of wood available on their doorstep at Barmah," Mrs Tyrrell said.

"Allowing locals to collect firewood in the Barmah Forest will clear fire hazards and regenerate the forest itself and I call on Mr Dimopoulos to exercise some common sense and open the forest for firewood collection."
